SHARK MUFFIN (Brooklyn, NY)

Who's in the band and what do they play?

TARRA: On our record "Chartreuse" that we are releasing August 7th, the band is Tarra Thiessen (guitar/vocals), Natalie Kirch (bass/vocals), and Patty Schemel (drums).

The line-up for the touring band this summer is Tarra Thiessen (guitar/vocals), Natalie Kirch (bass/vocals), Davey Jones (Guitar), and Sharif Mekawy (drums).



When and how did you become a band?

TARRA: When I was reading tarot cards at a middle school slumber party I had a vision of the Princess of Cups- a sweet nymph like compassionate blonde girl who had a badass fat bass tone. She then came to me through a trail of spiritual guiders each baring the name Nat. We met up for the first time at the now-closed DIY venue, Death By Audio each immediately manifested our spirit animals - Shark & Muffin.

How did you decide on your band name?

TARRA: We jammed at Natalie's Jersey shore beach house and didn't go into the ocean early in the morning because we had the fear of becoming a Sharkmuffin - the breakfast for a shark. To conquer this fear, we became THE SHARKMUFFIN.

Tell us about your first show.

NAT: Our first show was at an art space in Bushwick called The Hive which no longer exists that was, at the time, displaying art by Liz Emirzian. It was my first show ever. I was so nervous I almost threw up. That was exactly three years ago.

Can you describe your music? TARRA: GP Glam Grunge

What bands (or other things) are your influences/inspiration?

NAT: The White Stripes, NIRVANA, The Ronettes, The Ventures, The Shirelles, Ty Segall, Thee Oh Sees, X-Ray Spex, Hole, The Pretenders, The Replacements, The Ramones, The Buzzcocks, Sonic Youth, The Breeders, Pixies, Johnny Thunders, Sebadoh, The Wipers, tons of other stuff... a lot of '90s grunge/alternative rock, 60s surf rock, 70s punk/ glam rock, and 50s female-fronted pop groups.

Gear talk: instruments/pedals/amps

NAT: I use a Series 70 cut out bass guitar that was based on one of the Ampeg mmodels from the 1960s. A couple years ago, Tarra bought me a discontinued Ampeg amplifier and a Death By Audio Apocalypse fuzz pedal for my birthday.

TARRA: I usually play a 2009 Fender Jaguar Special HH Version through a 1966 Fender Pro Reverb with my pedal board that consists of: Death by Audio Fuzz War, Death by Audio Interstellar Overdriver, Death by Audio Echo Dream, Seymour Duncan SFX-07 Shape Shifter Tremolo, Boss DD-6 Digital Delay & a Boss RE-20 Space Echo (for vocals). I use Augustine Spectra Light Electric strings (.010-.046) & Dunlop Gator Grip 1.14 mm picks.

SM (of Looms): I use a combination of sabian and Zildjian cymbals, My hardware is a combo of Gibraltar, DW, and pearl.

DJ (of Lost b+Boy?): Jagstang guitar, fender blues JR, pedals: Cement Lunch, (Boss)Tremolo, (Boss)EQ, (Boss)Delay, (digi tech) reverb / delay

Who are your favorite local New York bands?

TARRA & NAT: Lost Boy?, Granny, Happy Lives, Daywalkers, Haybaby, Fruit & Flowers, Holy Tunics, Charly Bliss, BOYTOY, etc. There are lots of incredible bands around here.

What do you want everyone to know about your band?
NAT: We are nice gals who like the ocean, sketching, writing, cats, moonlit pizza parties and reverb.

Any other comments/shout outs?

Our debut LP 'Chartreuse' will be out on August 7th on Little Dickman/State Capital Records!! Pre-order your copy now on the State Capital website and you'll get a chartreuse/silver swirl vinyl. http://sharkmuffin.com/



ALICE BAG + THE BAGUETTES (Los Angeles, CA)

Who is in the band and what do they play?
Alice: The band is Angie Skull on Bass, Fiona
Ngo on lead Guitar,
Alice Bag on rhythm guitar and vocals. We are not a regular band,
Angie and Fiona are friends who happen to be musicians and volunteered to help me on my book tour.

When and how did you become a band?

Alice: Angle and I have been playing together off and on for several



years, she did most of my Violence Girl tour dates with me. Fiona played with me a few times when I visited Champaign and we loved hanging out and making music together so we agreed that she would play with me whenever her schedule as a full time professor would allow.

How did you come up with your band name?

Alice: We didn't actually have a band name but since you asked, we thought we should come up with one. We considered Alice and The Bag Ladies, The Suffragette Setters, and Alice Bag and The Baguettes. The last one made us smile the most.

Tell us about your first show?

Alice: We have yet to do our first show together. It will happen July 12th in Los Angeles. Fiona lives in Illinois and Angie and I are in California, so we have been practicing long distance and will get together a couple of times before our first show.

Can you describe your music?

Alice: We're doing all original songs that work with the some of the ideas that come up in Pipe Bomb for The Soul. The songs weren't written for the book tour, I've been writing songs for years and some of the stuff just seems to fit. They range from punk to pop to jazzy, and by jazzy I mean songs where I use chords that sound good to me but are not commonly used in pop or punk songs. When I don't know the name of a chord I just give it a name, I have a favorite chord I call Betsy.

What bands or (things) inspire you?

Fiona: Current bands that I've been listening to are Trash Kit/ Sacred Paws (Rachel Aggs is a total genius), Nots, Opposite Sex, Priests, Downtown Boys, and I still can't get enough of last year's Ex Hex album. I'm also a longtime fan of Eric Dolphy, Charles Mingus, and Thelonious Monk.

Alice: Sex Stains, No Small Children and Trap Girl are some of my favorite local bands here in Los Angeles. I recently had the opportunity to volunteer at a girls' rock camp called Chicas Rockeras in

South East L.A. and that was a wonderful experience. Encouraging creativity in the campers and seeing their self confidence blossom was thrilling, it made me realize the power we have to shape

our youth. Helping young girls find their voices and teaching them that it's ok to take up space and to be assertive all through the medium of rock and roll, that is inspiring stuff!

Gear Talk: instruments, pedais, amps.

Fiona: I have a Fender American Standard Telecaster and a Guild Starfire III. Right now I'm playing through a Liverpool Pedal and a 70s' Fender Music Master Bass Amp.


Alice: I have a Gibson SG but I also like to play my blue Brownsville acoustic. Sometimes I use a Boss DS-1 distortion pedal. I recently started using hand crafted strings and I absolutely love the way they sound and feel. If you're ever in East L.A., treat yourself to a set of Guadalupe Custom Strings. Angle: I mostly play a Fender Musicmaster bass, but I also have a Vox teardrop bass I love. Ampeg amp, it's gotta be Ampeg!

Favorite Detroit band or Artists?

Alice: I grew up listening to Motown and I still can't resist singing along to The Supremes but my first record was Freda Payne's Band of Gold and it's still a sentimental favorite.

Angie: I also grew up listening to Motown, Temptations, Supremes, Smokey Robinson and the Miracles, Aretha Franklin. I do like me some MC5 too!

Fiona: I had a chance to see Invincible and was duly impressed with their lyrics about quantum physics and a critical trans politics. Mick Collins' projects are always inspiring: the GORIES!!!



Tell us about your new book.

Alice: The book is based on a diary I kept when I was volunteering in Nicaragua in 1986. I was teaching at the time and many of my students were Central American. I was also doing graduate work. I figured that I might be able to satisfy my curiosity about Nicaragua and the Sandinista revolution by visiting the country but I wanted to college credit too, so I asked a professor if he would allow me to do an independent study of the Sandinista Literacy Campaign and he agreed. He asked me to journal every day. Years later I found the journal nestled among my photo albums. It was the starting point for the book. I've added quite a bit of reflection from an older point of view. It was an exciting time to be in Nicaragua and it was a life changing trip for me.

When did you first start making art?


Well I think I learned to draw as a kid by drawing Princess Jasmine hundreds of times.

Who are you and what do you do?


I'm Lucy, I draw femmes fatales, write, and listen to the same mixtage over and over.


When did you first start making art?


When you think of the word riot what comes to mind?

Revolting against something that is fucked up, or

something successfully hilarious (As in, "Wasn't that comedy show a riot?!"). What a strange language we have, where one word can define two completely opposite sentiments.

What drew inspiration for the artwork for this show?

I was approached by the editors of *Radar Poetry* to make an illustration to accompany a poem in their 5th issue, "Kelly the Killer Kapowsi" by Rachel Ronquillo Gray. It references a Saved by the Bell episode ("Fatal Distraction") in which Zach Morris wants Kelly Kapowski to go to the dance with him, so he plants listening devices and spies on Kelly's slumber party in order to find out who she's going with. The girls figure it out and play this elaborate "Fatal Attraction"-like prank, to



get even for their privacy being invaded. Kelly basically stalks Zach, and the girls manage to convince him that Kelly is a homicidal maniac that snaps whenever she's in love with a boy. Zach, terrified, turns to Principal Belding for help, and when Mr. Belding learns Zach is so scared of sweet girl Kelly, he laughs and replies, "What's she gonna do? Spike you to death with a volleyball?" It was a lucky coincidence that I've seen every episode of Saved by the Bell and knew exactly what Gray was referencing in her poem. She took this "what's she gonna do, she's a girl, man up!' attitude and flipped it on it's head, writing this super violent poem wherein Kelly Kapowski beats the living shit out of Zach Morris with a baseball bat. I wanted to mirror this point in the collage. So, that's Volley.

What are some artists or musicians that you admire?

John Cates



bands and used going to art class as an excuse to get out of my regular classes.





Freedom of expression.



Who are you and what do you do? I'm Erin Norris and I am a sometimes oil

I'm Erin Norris and I am a sometimes oil painter, when I not making music with Casual Sweetheart.

When did you first start making art? As a little kid I was always drawing. I never went anywhere without a stack of paper and a box of crayons/pencils but I feel like most kids make art. In high school, I took some private art lessons but ultimately decided on going to college to be a scientist instead of an artist. A couple of years after college I was living in Oakland, California and bought an easel and oil paints but didn't really start painting until I



moved back to Michigan. I started off making abstract circular paintings and eventually took a few oil painting classes from John Maggie. It was there that I started painting portraits and felt like I was actually making art.

When you think of the word riot what comes to mind? The first thought I had is when people describe someone fun and wild, "oh, she's a total riot to hang out with." Then it makes me think of darker, aggressive things, where the tensions erupt physically for both good and bad reasons with results being victorious or devastating depending on where you stand. It also makes me think of



the riot grril movement. Riot = the struggle of good/bad that cannot be contained.

What drew inspiration for the artwork for this show? Courtney Love. Love her or hate her, she was a huge influence on me as a woman and musician. Although she is not part of the Riot Girrl movement and she did punch Kathleen Hannah in the face which is not cool, she is a riot in every sense of the word - unrestrained, passionate, destructive, disorderly...

Who are you and what do you do? I was born in Grand Rapids, Michigan where I lived until attending the University of Michigan's School of Art and Design. As an Undergraduate, my primary areas of focus were painting, film and photography because of the medium's inherent narrative properties. After college, I moved to Detroit, where my interest in communication and symbolism became more of a focus in my paintings. My current work often overlaps surrealist-like painting with traditional portraiture, while thematically

exploring ideas of gender dynamics, communication (and/or the inability to communicate), symbolism and





When did you first start making art? I honestly don't really remember. I suppose it's always been there. I have a memory from 1st grade- Mrs. Edies' Class- its Tuesday, which meant we had art that afternoon. I was giddy. I looked like a blowpop with these long twiggy limbs and giant head, maned with wild white-blonde hair. I bounced around all morning like a little pony, until I finally got in trouble. I got in trouble a lot. Either for doodling on everything or talking too much. Things really haven't changed. I showed a natural aptitude and inclination towards art at such a young age I am inclined to say I have always been making something or other.

When you think of the word riot what comes to mind? Force of Will. Reactive response to oppression. I think we are naturally predisposed to visualizing great angry masses of people swarming the streets, violently protesting perceived wrongs, which is in fact one example of a riot. But riots don't have to be so public and demonstrative- they are also the little things we do; the internal changes, the tiny shifts in thinking that break established patterns of beliefs that marginalize and oppress. There is no riot too small- it is every thought had, or action taken that works toward change.

What drew inspiration for the artwork for this show? The piece in the show is actually part of a larger body of work. I use the female form in varying positions and circumstances to see if an idea, emotion, or critique can be communicated using bodies, symbols, and titles. I am interested in different forms of communication (verbal, text, body language, etc) and how best to manipulate them to address gender issues specifically. Circumstances of living can have an unfortunate way of often making one feel silenced, especially for a women. This body of work is my personal way of addressing issues of communicating or the inability to communicate in relation to my gender. What are some artists or musicians that you admire? I could honestly give you an endless list of artists and writers that I admire. For starters the depth and vulnerability of Francis Bacon, Francesca Woodman, and Polly Morgan. The expansiveness of Terrence Malick. The playfulness and experimentation of Charline von Heyl, and Cosima von Bonin. The understated elegance of William Eggleston. The linage and vulnerability of Frida Kahlo, Ana Mendieta, Judy Chicago, Carolee Schneemann, Andrea Fraser, etc. Not to mention the witty vulgarity of John Waters and Donald Barthelme. The obsessive darkness of Gerhard Richter, Hanna Linden, LaMort, John Cocteau, Huysmans, Kafka. And the other-worldliness of Arda Collins and Karen Russell. As far as musicians, I tend to be less affected by musicians or group as I am specific songs. Again, the list is endless, so I'll spare you.



What drew inspiration for the artwork for this show? For "Betrayal" Mixed Media Collage (sending pic tomorrow): My inspiration for this piece mainly came

from a recent betrayal of trust and the chaos/turmoil that surrounded it for me. Deep inside, this event really tore my heart apart as I struggled to accept the truth of the situation instead of what I had wanted to happen. I guess you could call it a personal riot of sorts where I had to face a lot of my deepest fears, and overcome them, bit by bit.

What are some artists or musicians that you admire? At the moment, I'm really inspired by Monica Canilao's work. Earlier this month, I saw the debut of her curated show at the Inner State Gallery and was blown away. I love how she can take a found object and weave a story around it so that you feel as if you're taking part in it as well. She can make even the most mundane item - a comb, for instance - look ethereal and beautiful in the haunting way it's presented in her work. As far as musicians go, I'm a big fan of P.J. Harvey. I love how each of her albums are worlds apart musically, yet consistently amazing to listen to. Her attention to detail not only with the lyrics she writes but also her experimentation with various instruments/sounds, is one of the things I like best about her. She has an album for pretty much every mood of mine, which I love and can't always find with other artists.



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



When and how did you become a band? October 2013 when Lou Reed died. I (Robin) quit a pop band I was drumming for because I absolutely had to do something else. I talked to Kayleigh and Laura about playing drums and I'd jammed with Emily in the past, so we all got together and it just kept progressing from there. After we played around town a bit,



Kayleigh switched to bass to make the sound heavier and fuller, which meant we wouldn't have the two drummer effect. However, that changed when we met Claire. We first saw her playing in Nurse at Kelly's Bar, making the most deafening, confrontational noise we'd ever heard live. Claire didn't know we started off with two drummers and she asked if she could join on drums. There was nothing to think over really. We all unanimously approved.

How did you decide on your band name?

When and how did you start this project?

2000. I'd been working Anthony Miller of Maximum Cloud on a project called "The New Weird," he left town, so I started writing lyrics and recording solo.

Tell us about your first show.

It was in Bowling Green with Wolf Eyes and a TLASILA spoof band called "I Live in LA" with Mike Connelly of Hair Police. Sam Consiglio of Tamion 12"/Perfect Weiners and Butts played with me. I wore a dress, handmade for the occasion, by Amber of Interdimensional Transmissions. That was one of the two instances where I performed in a dress.

How would you describe your music? Expressive electronics.



What bands (or other things) are your influences/inspiration?

This continuously evolves and there's too much to list. When I first start, Cosey Fanni Tutti of Throbbing Gristle was a big influence. I sent her a CDr and she wrote back with feedback. It was around the time when musicians were starting to post contact info on the internet, so it was really novel and exciting to exchange email with her.

Gear talk: what is your setup? Is it true you make some of your gear? Can you tell us about how you got started doing that?

I started making sound with simple oscillators, circuit-bent electronics, and tapes because it was all I could afford, in terms of gear. Crafting my gear was desirable because it made the sounds feel more personal for me. At the time, there was an element of excitement to breaking something open and exploiting it's consumer intent. A few years later, people began selling circuit-bent things on ebay and circuit-bending lost some of it's appeal for me. The current modular synthesizer trend is similar to me, in that you buy a pre-built item and piece together. This is not to say I don't like using consumer equipment; I love my synthesizers and drum machines. I just finished grad school where I did a lot of work amplifying sculptural material with transducers, inspired by David Tudor and the wonderful Pauline Oliveros who I had the honor of working with at school. I'd like to continue this work in addition to using vocals again.

You used to perform as Viki, and now you perform as Viki Viktoria. Can you explain the difference between the two?

Haha - well, I actually started as Vixen Hott: the name of my first tape, then shortened to Viki. When I turned 30, I decided to give the project a name-lift, something sophisticated, and thought Viktoria would work. However, it just didn't stick, so I combined the names. Maybe I'll drop the Viki when I turn 40.

Who are your favorite Detroit artists? All my friends are brill.

What do you want everyone to know about this project?

I have 2 tapes coming out on Ginkgo and Isolated Now Waves.


